The great outdoors




NHS Wales operates as an integrated healthcare system. There are seven local Health Boards that are responsible for planning, commissioning, and delivering care within their locality across the full range of specialties including Primary Care, Community and Long-Term Care, Mental Health services, and Secondary Care. Some specialist services are provided on an All-Wales or regional basis in some of our larger tertiary centres.

The seven Health Boards are supported by three All-Wales NHS Trusts. Public Health Wales is responsible for improving public health outcomes, reducing health inequalities and for providing specialist screening services. Velindre University NHS Trust provides specialist cancer services and the Welsh Ambulance Service provides emergency and non-emergency patient transport across Wales.

Finally there are three other All-Wales bodies responsible for providing strategic, corporate, administrative, and technical services to the NHS in Wales.

Digital Health and Care Wales supports the modernisation of the health service through new innovative technologies. Health Education and Improvement Wales (HEIW) is a Special Health Authority responsible for the professional education, training, and development of the NHS Wales workforce. Finally, the NHS Wales Shared Services Partnership provides a range of administrative, technical, and professional support services to both the Health Boards and NHS Trusts.

Health Board Profiles

Tenby, Pembrokeshire



Aneurin Bevan University Health Board



One of the largest and busiest healthcare providers in the UK, Aneurin Bevan University Health Board provides healthcare to people living in South East Wales. This includes the city of Newport as well as the towns of Cwmbran, Abergavenny, Caerphilly and their surrounding areas.

Cwmbran is a thriving industrial, commercial and retail centre with good transport links. The town continues to grow with ongoing shopping and residential developments. It is the site of the new multi-million-pound Grange University Hospital, a Specialist Critical Care Centre that treats the most seriously ill patients, and those with significant injuries.

Abergavenny is nestled between seven hills close to the border between England and Wales; it truly is a 'Gateway to Wales'. A vibrant town with busy markets, Abergavenny holds a number of annual festivals attracting visitors far and wide. It is home to Nevill Hall Hospital which provides a range of inpatient medical and surgical specialties to the local area.



As Wales' third largest city, Newport is surrounded by beautiful landscapes including the Wye Valley, an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, the Brecon Beacons National Park and the Forest of Dean. Newport is home to the Royal Gwent Hospital and provides a comprehensive range of emergency and elective services to the population of Newport and South Monmouthshire.

Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board



As the largest Health Board in Wales and one of the largest healthcare providers in the UK, Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board provides healthcare to the people of North Wales.

Both geographically large and diverse in its landscape, North Wales has something to offer every lifestyle. In the North West is the stunningly beautiful Snowdonia National Park, world renowned for its rugged landscape, Welsh culture and of course Wales' highest mountain - Yr Wyddfa. North East Wales offers a different pace of life. From the popular seaside resorts of Rhyl and Prestatyn, to the bustling shops of Wrexham, North East Wales is predominately urbanised with excellent transport links to the major centres of population in Liverpool, Manchester and

Situated close to the coastal town of Rhyl, Glan Clwyd Hospital provides services to the population of central North Wales whilst Wrexham Maelor, one of the largest hospitals in Wales, serves the North East. It has a busy A&E department and, as a teaching hospital, was voted the best in Wales by Cardiff University medical students.

Cardiff & Vale University Health Board



Cardiff, the thriving Welsh capital has something for everyone. It is a fantastic city to work and live in with great communication links, a booming economy and a dynamic tertiary education sector. It is the centre of the Welsh Government and has an abundance of sports, arts and cultural attractions. The local population is growing rapidly, with Cardiff projected to be the fastest growing major British city over the next 20 years.

Cardiff & Vale University Health Board has a strong reputation for excellence in medical research and clinical innovation with strong links to a wide range of academic institutions including Cardiff University, the University of South Wales and Cardiff Metropolitan University. Hospitals include the University Hospital of Wales (UHW), the third largest hospital in the UK and the University Hospital Llandough (UHL). In addition to the local population of Cardiff, the Health Board also serves the wider population across Wales (and often the UK) with highly specialist treatment and complex services such as major trauma, neurosurgery and cardiac services. The Health Board is also home to Wales's only Children's Hospital; The Noah's Ark Children's Hospital for Wales.



Cwm Taf Morgannwg University Health Board



Ideally situated between Wales's capital city, Cardiff to the south, the coastal town Porthcawl to the west and the stunning scenery in the Brecon Beacons National Park to the north, Cwm Taf Morgannwg University Health Board operates within a vibrant community, and heritage. The area is steeped with rich history, widely recognised across the UK and around the world as the driving force of the industrial revolution and the coal industry.

The Princess of Wales Hospital is located on the outskirts of the town of Bridgend. The hospital provides a comprehensive range of acute surgery and medicine for patients of all ages, including inpatient, outpatient and day services. The Royal Glamorgan Hospital is located in a semi-rural area, just 13 miles from the city of Cardiff. The hospital is cushioned by areas of outstanding beauty; the Glamorgan Heritage Coast, the Gower Peninsula and Rhondda Heritage Park are all within a short driving distance. Prince Charles Hospital in Merthyr Tydfil, provides sub-regional oral and maxillofacial services, a full range of locally provided and visiting specialist outpatient services and has an extensive range of diagnostic services.

Hywel Dda University Health Board

Covering a large geographical area, Hywel Dda University Health Board provides healthcare to the three counties of Ceredigion, Carmarthenshire and Pembrokeshire in beautiful West Wales. With affordable housing, friendly market towns, a strong sense of community and numerous areas of outstanding natural beauty, West Wales is the ideal location to bring up a family.

Situated on the beautiful Ceredigion coast and in the University town of Aberystwyth, Bronglais General Hospital may be the smallest district hospital in the UK, but its teams, services and departments are recognised for having achieved excellence in many fields of care.

Noted for its beautiful rolling hills, picturesque Welsh countryside and market towns, Carmarthenshire is home to two district General Hospitals. Glangwili General Hospital is situated in the bustling market town of Carmarthen and provides a wide range of acute inpatient medical and surgical services. Whilst Prince Philip Hospital is a modern, progressive and well-equipped hospital that serves the larger population of Llanelli.

As one of the UK's most popular holiday resorts, Pembrokeshire is noted for its idyllic countryside, small market towns, award winning beaches and the breath-taking beauty of its world-famous coastline. Within Pembrokeshire, Withybush General Hospital offers a wide range of opportunities across a variety of clinical specialities.

Powys Teaching Health Board



Powys is both a rural and geographically large county, covering a quarter of the landmass of Wales. Promising incredible beauty, affordable housing and a relaxed pace of life, it's not surprising that Powys is one of the happiest places to work and live.

Famous events such as the Hay Festival, the Royal Welsh Show and the Green Man Festival may attract annual visitors to Powys, but it's the county's extraordinary ability to make everyday life so much better that invites health professionals and their families to build a future here; allowing your children to grow up in one of the most beautiful and safest parts of the country.

As a rural health board, Powys provides as many services as possible locally, through GPs and other primary care services, community hospitals and community services. Services include nine community hospitals located across the county and four Minor Injury Units across the county where Nurse Practitioners are supported by local GPs to treat a wide range of minor illness and injuries. The Health Board also has two dedicated Day Surgery Units that have an excellent reputation for varied training opportunities, career advancement, ongoing skill acquisition and team working.

Swansea Bay University Health Board

Swansea is Wales's second largest city and the regional capital of South West Wales. It is a University city with a rich history and flourishing cultural scene. As a waterfront city it has access to some of the most beautiful beaches in the UK on the Gower Peninsula - the UK's first Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. It also benefits from being able to offer outstanding leisure and recreational opportunities.

Morrison Hospital is one of the largest hospitals in Wales with approximately 720 beds. It is the regional acute tertiary hospital for South West Wales, offering a range of specialist services, including trauma and orthopaedics, renal medicine, neurology, oral and maxillofacial surgery. It is home to the Welsh Centre for Burns and Plastic Surgery and has one of the busiest emergency departments (A&E) in Wales. Singleton Hospital, overlooking Swansea Bay, hosts a range of services including acute assessment, acute medicine and care of the elderly. It has about 330 beds and provides a regional consultant-led maternity unit and neonatal intensive care.



Velindre University NHS Trust



Velindre University NHS Trust (VUNHST) delivers specialist cancer services for South East Wales using a hub and spoke model.

The hub of our specialist cancer services is Velindre Cancer Centre in Cardiff. This is a specialist treatment, teaching, research and development centre for non-surgical oncology. We treat patients with chemotherapy, Systemic Anti-Cancer Treatments (SACTs), radiotherapy and related treatments, together with caring for patients with specialist palliative care needs.

The Welsh Blood Service plays a fundamental role in the delivery of healthcare in Wales. It works to ensure that the donor's gift of blood is transformed into safe and effective blood components, which allow NHS Wales to improve quality of life and save the lives of many thousands of people in Wales every year.

There are exciting times ahead for VUNHST! A new cancer centre was approved for development, here in Cardiff, by the Welsh Government in 2021. The current Velindre Cancer Centre is around 60 years-old and it was decided that new facilities and space were required to deal with the future challenges of cancer services in Wales.

The new Velindre Cancer Centre (VCC) will treat more patients and help more people live longer with cancer. It will be an NHS service, treating people according to need and will be free at the point of delivery. It will also support international research and development aiming to make Wales a world leader in cancer treatment. The new cancer centre is designed to work for future generations including our staff, patients and neighbours.
