Research and Development

Wales opened its first PET CT scanner in September 2010, sited at UHW, Cardiff. This is a joint venture between the University and the NHS. This will afford many research and clinical opportunities to the patients and staff of the area. It will facilitate a high specification and locally provided service.

There is a dedicated Radiology Suite including an ultrasound room, fluoroscopy room and an MRI scanner in the Children's Hospital for Wales in Cardiff.

The Radiology School is progressive and forward thinking. Wales has been a pilot site for several developments with the delivery and management of education in Wales. The RCR Curriculum has undergone a major review and this will be reflected in the delivery of the curriculum in Wales.

Recruitment into Radiology is through the National Recruitment System and handled by the College of Shared Services, formally known as the London Deanery, which involves an online application and interviews held once a year in London. 
