As Professional Head of Nursing, I am the senior operational nurse for the community service group. Next on my travels was West Sussex, where I worked in critical care and I enjoyed my time there but I wanted to move back home to Wales. In 2007, I joined Hywel Dda University Health Board at Bronglais Hospital, continuing my work in critical care. I went on to



progress into clinical site management and became a ward manager. Towards the end of that role, I was honoured to receive a Royal College of Nursing (RCN) Wales Nurse of the Year Award for Leadership.
